





GIBRALTAR ROCK

Standing on top of the Rock, you feel as if you are on top of the world. From a height of 426m you have a truly breathtaking view across the Strait of Gibraltar, where the waters of the Atlantic meet the Mediterranean, to the African coastline about 14.5 kilometres away. If you turn around, you can look west and east along Spain's sunny coastline, and when you look down, you have a bird's eye view of the community far below, with its quays, marinas and bays. Huddled along the narrow strip of land at the foot of the Rock, live the 33,000 people who inhabit this British Overseas Territory at the southern tip of Spain. The famous Rock itself is visible from every point on the territory. It dominates the landscape and is instantly recognisable when you arrive by air or sea.

10 As well as being a prominent landmark, the Rock also houses many of Gibraltar's attractions, such as the Moorish Castle, dating back to medieval times, and two networks of tunnels in the rock, more than 50 kilometres long, built by British military forces. There is also a complex of caves, the largest one of which has been converted into a concert hall for about 400 people. There is even a myth that the caves connect to a tunnel under the Strait across to Morocco.

The Rock is a nature reserve which can be explored on a variety of walking trails. There is also a cable car to take visitors to Upper Rock. The original vegetation on the Rock was forest but it was destroyed over the centuries by tree felling and goat grazing. Now it is mostly covered with grass and small bushes. It is also an important resting place for migrating birds. They stop to rest and feed on their way to Africa and on their way back to Europe in spring.

Gibraltar's most widely known tourist attraction, the Barbary monkeys, also live on the Rock. Their natural home is in North Africa, but their presence in Gibraltar dates from the early days of British occupation when they probably were imported. The 300 monkeys which now live in five healthy troops on the steep slopes of the Rock are the only wild monkey population in Europe. In 2012, because of rising numbers, there was even talk of sending some one hundred monkeys back to Africa. The wardens of the nature reserve still

want visitors to have 'the monkey experience' but experts have warned that too much human interaction is harmful to these wild animals.



The monkeys are portrayed on Gibraltar's five-pence coin and many legends have grown up around them. One is that they travelled to Gibraltar from their native Africa via an underground tunnel underneath the Strait of Gibraltar. Another legend says that, should the monkeys ever disappear, the British will leave Gibraltar. By the end of the Second World War, the number of monkeys had gone down dramatically due to disease and other natural causes. Fortunately, Sir Winston Churchill, the British Prime Minister at the time, took a personal interest and additional animals were imported from Morocco. In 1954 they were even visited by Queen Elizabeth II while she and Prince Philip were in Gibraltar.

The Rock's latest attraction, the Skywalk, was opened in March 2018. It is located at 340 metres above sea-level, which is higher up than the highest point of London's tallest skyscraper, The Shard. Through its glass floor, the Skywalk offers a unique view to the bottom of the Rock. It is built on the foundations of a military lookout point and is designed to carry a load equivalent to five Asian elephants, or 340 people, but visitor numbers are limited to 50 at any one time. As a visitor from England said: "Standing on a sheet of glass hundreds of feet up in the air is not everybody's cup of tea, but the views are outstanding."

THE MONKEYS OF GIBRALTAR

Apparently, there has been a population of monkeys on Gibraltar Rock for a very long time. However, the legend that brought the monkeys their widespread popularity actually comes from a later period: the time of the Great Siege between 1779 and 1783. The French and Spanish forces made a combined effort to take control of the Rock from the British. In the course of a surprise attack one evening, the monkeys were disturbed and started to make a lot of noise. This drew the attention of the British, and the French and Spanish attack was unsuccessful. It was this event which started the legend that as long as there are monkeys on the Rock of Gibraltar, the British will keep control of the territory.

Visitors who want to get close to the monkeys are advised to stay in the open areas. If you meet the monkeys in narrow spaces, on the staircases in the tunnels for example, the monkeys might feel cornered and then will react aggressively. In such a situation it is best to go back a little and give the monkeys more space. In the company of the monkeys it is not a good idea to crouch down; this might be seen as an invitation to climb up or jump on your back. A final word of warning: the monkeys are very curious and they like to steal bags or handbags, and especially anything that could contain food.

Over the years, people in Gibraltar have learnt how to treat their animal neighbours. A lot of human food is bad for the monkeys' health. If the public feed them it also damages the monkeys' social structures: the monkeys live in a community in which each one has a certain role. This group structure and hierarchy is damaged by human influence. What is more, when tourists feed them, it makes them dependent on humans. For these reasons, it is officially forbidden to feed them. Anyone who is caught feeding them has to pay a very high fine.

As long as visitors take these warnings seriously, there is no reason why they shouldn't enjoy meeting the monkeys. Indeed, no visit to Gibraltar would be really complete without it.
